
- Reunion Weekend will celebrate the 125th Anniversary of the Crane School of Music.

Congratulations Ago— 130 years young!

Many thanks to our friends at Alpha Delta —the following information was cited from their current website:

"In St. Lawrence County, women were admitted to all the early public and private institutions. St. Lawrence Academy in Potsdam, NY was founded in 1816 and began receiving state aid in 1836 from the Board of Regents to instruct classes of common-school teachers. It was merged with the newly chartered Potsdam Normal School in 1868, one of the first four such state schools to train teachers. (A normal school was a



school created to train high school graduates to be teachers. Its purpose was to establish teaching standards or *norms*, hence its name.) Among the many Normal School graduates were pioneer women educators who each helped establish the "Potsdam Tradition" of encouraging individual students to develop their potential.

The current SUNY Potsdam sororities evolved from the two Potsdam Normal School literary societies, the Alpha Literary Society and the Calliopean Literary Society. The main purpose of these first societies was to give women a chance to debate.

The Calliopean Literary Society became Zeta Gamma Upsilon, and in December of 1928 became Alpha Kappa Phi, the Agonian or more commonly known now as Ago." (http://www.alphadeltakappasorority.com/history)

The Tradition Continues....

While the Calliopean Literary Society set the stage for women to participate in debates, there is no debating the influence that Ago's have had on SUNY Potsdam's history, traditions and impact beyond the campus. We can all, once again, be proud of prestigious honors bestowed upon our own:

Kathy White Finnerty (Class of 1975) - Saint Lawrence Academy Medal, presented to an alumnus who has made significant contributions to the field of professional education or related fields. The honor is named for the predecessor institution to SUNY Potsdam.

Lynne Boles (Class of 1974) Minerva Award, presented to an alumnus who has demonstrated outstanding lifetime professional achievement.

They will be honored at the dinner on Saturday evening of Alumni Weekend. We are proud of our sisters who are so deserving of these esteemed awards!

AGONIAN MEMORIES

I totally ignored Fran's appeal for memories of the AGO House in the 60's, anticipating that someone else would accept the challenge. Every e-mail I received from Kate asked about my progress on the assignment – and each time I responded with some flippant remark as to who would really want to know such things? Still, Kate persisted. There was no putting off Kate! So...out came the photo albums and other detritus of college mementos – copies of The Racquette, The Pioneer, even a Junior Prom Queen poster..... and recollections flooded my senses.

The album provided countless snapshots of Agos lounging around the house, getting into costume for a skit or theme party, preparing for some special occasion. But the most memorable photos were those that pictured us dressed for action and singing. Dressed in stockings, heels, and our signature White Blazers with arms around each other singing – always singing –often *from the front porch railing!* The Children's Christmas Party with Ago elves, parents in the circle of friendship; Open Houses, Freshmen Teas, Rush Parties, Pledge Parties, and The AGO Auction – apprehension clearly visible on all of our faces, imagining being auctioned-off & no one bidding!

Living at the Ago House as a junior was a coveted opportunity – only 4 could do so, and our reward was to have a dresser and an assigned bookshelf area in the hall. Along with this honor was the responsibility to help in the running of the house - everyone had chores. And oh, yes, our one phone... with 2 extensions: the public one in the upstairs hallway, where those 4 living-in-the-hall juniors were the unofficial message-takers; and the private/ preferred one in a closet off the dining room.

The 2nd floor rooms were where everyone lived, studied, lounged (except for the 4 who *lived* in the hall) – but no one slept in those 2nd floor bedrooms! Sleeping was relegated to the dark, unheated 3rd floor dormitory of bunk beds. Wisely, the first possession you acquired upon moving into the Ago House was the heaviest down comforter you could afford or barter from a senior as she packed up after graduation. My comforter was left to me in a "senior will"!

Only one person was allowed an alarm clock in that frigid, drafty 3rd floor dorm – imagine 22 alarms and snooze-buttons! Someone (certainly not I) volunteered to be the earliest riser; thus began the daily ritual of wake-up calls. A board on the wall beside the stairway to the dorms had wake-up times and nametags. We hung our nametag on the time we wished to be awakened and removed our nametag as we staggered down the stairs by the board in the morning. Of course there was an incentive for being prompt since the final straggler was responsible for the next round of wake-up calls!

We made our own breakfasts (allotted one egg/day) and had lunch elsewhere, but the expectations were very specific for dinner. Mrs. D (our House Mother) was the subtle director of the dining ritual —no phone interruptions and no talking between tables. We could sign-out for dinner, but we were never late! The closest we came to being late, was arriving last to our assigned table. Then, the head chair would be empty and waiting! This scorned position represented the 'privilege' of serving, clearing, and cleaning up.

Even though the Ago House was technically off-campus, college rules still applied. No alcohol in the house, no males on the 2nd floor, a 10-mile radius travel-restriction (unless written parental permission extended it), and curfews of 10:30 and 1:00 on weekends. The porch lights blinked a 3-minute warning as curfew neared. Couples in clutches peppered the Ago front porch while others dashed across the street from the Clarkson library or desperately looked for a parking place before the lights went out and the doors were locked.

There was no thought of "cabin-fever" during the arctic cold of February. The (now long-lost) tradition of Ice Carnival encompassed every action and activity between the Clarkson and Potsdam campus. We rushed to Ice Show practice in the bitterly cold hockey arena, campaigned for Ice Carnival Queen, or took our turn in the front yard fashioning the monstrous themed Ice Sculpture, perfecting the finger-numbing skills of slush-making and ice-ironing.

Competition, community service, and leadership were an integral part of Ago in the 1960's! ...and we were competitive! We wanted to have the most candidates for Junior Prom Queen, the most Ice Carnival Queen candidates; we wanted the Queen to be OURS ... an AGO! We most certainly wanted to out-shine our biggest rivals, those Alphas! Agos were leaders in every facet of campus life – white blazers everywhere representing Ago!

But the fondest memories were the friendships and foolishness that encompassed everyday life in the Ago House. I remember being greeted as a pledge by a porch full of singing Agos. I remember being at Jane Andre's beck & call when she was my Big Sister. I remember the white formal evening gowns we wore for the Ago Initiation. I remember the thrill of climbing on those porch railings and singing to the next pledge class. I remember the chimes that were used to call a meeting to order, to call us to dinner, to signify the final moments before curfew when doors were locked.

I remember having to stuff all of Bunny's clothing under the bed when there was a room inspection. I remember May affecting her brogue and doing her Irish washerwoman routine as she tackled cleaning the dining room floor. I remember late-night discussions about this *new* thing called a birth control pill. I remember fire drills from the 3rd floor fire escape and not wanting to be the first one to "ride the ladder down." I remember occasionally watching TV in Mrs. D's room – on the only television in the house! I remember after-hours fraternity serenades when a sister was "pinned."

I remember wool knee socks, wool plaid skirts, and wool sweaters – the only time I'd ever needed that much warmth! I remember Linda's and Bunny's raccoon coats; oh, how we envied them! I remember lamenting that once again the Ago Anchor had been stolen. I remember many an early morning getting stuck on an unplowed street. I remember many a late night typing and re-typing a term paper because I couldn't white-out the *entire* paragraph I needed to move. I remember illicitly sunbathing on the porch roof and sleeping there on a sweltering June night.

I remember arriving to a 4-building campus called "the quad". And I remember *knowing* Dr. Crumb, Dr. Hosmer, Dr. Maxcy, Dr. Barrington, Dr. Satterlee - the people for whom the additional buildings are now named! But most of all I remember the pride we had in being Agos and the long-lasting friendships we formed that will be rekindled at this year's 50th Reunion!

Preserving Ago's Past

As we celebrate 130 years as the Agonian Sorority, our collection of very special Ago treasures has grown! While many of our cherished items have been kept at 11 P, others may be in your personal anchor and yellow rose collections. We have noticed that our oldest composites from the Calliopean Literary Society days have begun to show their age. Composites from more recent decades have even disappeared during fraternity raids. Our beautiful white blazers are no longer part of the Ago tradition. So how do we preserve Ago's history? We have sought the help of Potsdam's Archivist Matt Francis. In the fall, we showed him an old composite from the Calliopean Literary Society that had lost its frame and had been damaged. Matt is very interested in learning more about our history and is holding this composite for us in the Archives. (Yes, we can still borrow it for our Reunions!) Matt observed that the Greek holdings in the Archives are small considering the impact Greek Life has had on Potsdam life. Matt would like to see other items of significance to our Sorority added to the Archives. He currently has Anchors from 1968-2007, but is missing our newsletters prior to '68 and after '07. If you have any of the missing Anchors, Matt would be willing to add them to the collection in the Archives (in the Crumb Library). He would also be interested in an Ago blazer, programs from old events, composites, etc. Of course, financial help would be appreciated in order to properly restore and care for our history. 2012 Agonian Alumnae Association Scholarship Award

One hundred thirty years ago, a group of Potsdam Normal School students, looking for a way to enrich their educational experience, formed the Calliopean Literary Society. Their debates and dances were held in the old Snell Hall on Pierrepont Ave. Since 1882, both the Society and the College have grown and changed in response to students' needs, and today we recognize their legacy as the Agonian Sorority, Alpha Kappa Phi, of SUNY Potsdam and Clarkson University. Imagine the pride these Calliopeans would have in the longevity of our Sorority and the impact we have had on the Potsdam community!

Agos have always held leadership positions on campus, often serving their College as Orientation Leaders, Resident Advisors, and Student Government Association and club officers. Our Sorority offers many positions as well, and we officially (for those offices with Sr. and Jr. titles) and informally (by working side by side under the guidance of other Sisters) model leadership skills. Excellence in leadership enables us to maintain our standards and ensure our future. Those involved in running the Sorority and the House know they must be responsible and accountable if Ago is to thrive.

Agonian Alumnae continue the tradition of leadership. Ardra Cavanaugh Rogers, Class of 1927, holds the trifecta for first: first president of Ago, first president of the Potsdam Alumni Association, and their first Distinguished Service Award recipient. Following in her footsteps, three dedicated Agonian Alumnae serve on Potsdam's Foundation Board and two serve on Potsdam's Alumni Board. Potsdam's Alumni Award recipients include four Agonian Minerva Award honorees, six Agonian Distinguished Service Award honorees, and one Agonian St. Lawrence Academy Medal honoree. We are proud of the leadership and service of our Alumnae Sisters!

Suzanne Wajda, Class of 1974's Social Chairman and Ice Carnival Queen, recognized the need to officially organize Ago's Alumnae. In 1976, while a graduate student at Clarkson, Sue formed the Agonian Alumnae Association and served as its president through 2001. Under her leadership, the tradition of offering scholarships to our Sisters at Potsdam and Clarkson began in 1978. Our first scholarship, awarded to an Agonian for Academic Excellence, honored Laurena Ramsdell, a long-standing member of our Board of Directors. Eunice "Brownie" Badger served as Ago's Advisor from 1921-1983, and we honored her by adding a second scholarship in 1991 for Excellence in Service. In Sue's honor, we created a third scholarship for Excellence in Leadership in 2004.

It is the Suzanne Wajda Scholarship for Excellence in Leadership that we are proud to award this year to Audrianna Vahue, a Senior from Rochester, NY. Audrianna is an Early Childhood/Childhood Education Major with a Geology Minor. She pledged Fall 2009 and has held many positions in the Sorority and participated on countless committees, including Risk Management and Recruitment. In these roles, Audrianna contributed to "discussions about ways in which Ago can change in order to continue to be a successful organization with a positive impact on the Potsdam community." She learned what it takes to "make a chapter successful, which in turn makes a community successful." She learned leadership skills from Ago when she held the Junior InterSorority Council position and shadowed the Sister in the Senior position. Through experiences over her years on this committee, Audrianna also gained extremely valuable leadership skills from Julie Dold, Potsdam's Assistant Director of Campus Life.

For this scholarship, we ask our applicant to cite a leader she admires. Audrianna credits Julie with being an "amazing leader" for Potsdam's Greek Community because she spends" countless hours working with each Chapter in order to make it the best it can be." Julie leads by "showing a willingness to learn about the Greeks' traditions and values" and by seeing all of a situation's perspectives. By responding with "thoughtful and fair decisions," Julie "respects the love and dedication the Greeks have for their community." Julie's hard work inspired Audrianna to "work with the different opinions of each House, while respecting individual traditions and beliefs," thereby uniting Potsdam's sororities and expanding ISC's mission. Witnessing Julie's "drive and dedication as she deals with difficult situations on a regular basis" motivated Audrianna enough to have the courage to run for President of ISC. Sensing that others were losing interest and fearing the College would decide the Greek Community no longer needed to exist, she focused on one goal: strengthening ISC and making people believe again." In this position, Audrianna used her leadership skills to guide Potsdam's sororities toward a common goal of raising \$6000 for the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

In support of Audrianna's application, Julie shares that our Sister has "put forth more leadership and service than any other officer from ISC," "continually providing guidance and motivation for the other sororities on campus." Recently the members of ISC expressed the desire to have a "larger purpose and functionality." In spearheading ISC's first community service project for the Make-A-Wish Foundation, Audrianna not only raised significant funds for a charitable organization, but also "gave each chapter something to work towards," thus "uniting the sororities on campus. Chapters who might not have worked together in the past are getting to know one another. She provided people, Greek and non-Greek, with an opportunity to better understand what a sorority woman is really about." Julie believes Audriana "exemplifies leadership and service very befitting to the namesakes of our scholarship awards."

Audrianna knows that "being a leader takes strength and courage," as it is difficult to lead diverse groups toward a common goal. As an Agonian, she gained the confidence necessary to do this. Her leadership skills brought her success on ISC and during her student teaching experiences. She will continue to use the leadership skills she gained through Ago as she works on her Master's Degree in Literacy and begins her professional teaching career. Congratulations, Audrianna!

Ago's Scholarship Committee takes the time to read through our Actives' applications and thoughtfully decide who our recipient should be. Through this process, much is learned about the activities of our Sisters, who are committed to their academics, Ago, and the greater Potsdam community. Working together on this committee were: Laurie Wood Cooper '77, Rachel Gebhardt '09, Amy Hind Henry '76, Debbie Diefendorf Hind '75, Serena Krauz '07, Stephanie Allen Manuel '91, Georgie Czerniak McGlinchey '77, Lindsay Mermell '09, Licia Urtis Murrell '82, Jenna Naylor '09, Cathy O'Connor '76, Amy Rich '10, Patty Abernethy Sohl '77, and Liz O'Connor Utzig '77. 

But they were very experienced compared to us 17 and 18 year olds. One couple was kicked out of school for staying overnight together from their way back from vacation.
- Also, the returning vets were a lot for us young gals to handle but handle them we did or the inter-sorority council took away late (weekend hours) for punishment!
- Our hours were 8:00 weeknights until we earned a B average, then 10:30. Sunday night was 10:30, Friday and Saturday, 12:00. As sophomores we moved up to 10:30 weeknights, weekend the same. Needed special permission from Inter-Sorority Council members to go out of town any time!
- Sunday afternoon and evening hangout was McManus' Diner where music guys kept a jam session going all the time. (no money) The diner was next to the Alpha House on Main Street. Remember, we were all at the old campus one building at the corner of Main and Elm, across from the county building.
- No one could afford lots of clothes so we traded off especially gowns. Both PSTC (as it was then) and Clarkson frats had several formals a year. I attended 13 one year! I owned a very popular black suit!
- The music guys furnished music 4-6 on Friday afternoons for dancing in the gym. Always crowded! No refreshments, just dancing.
- We had to sign in and out every time we left our house so someone always could find us if necessary. Always!
