



Active New Member Educator Liaison Denise Bennett Haines '81

I serve on the Board of Directors as a Member at Large. I am currently the liaison to the New Member Educator, the now "Pledge Mistress", so we have open communication between the Actives and the Board.

The rush process has changed a bit, and especially during the pandemic as many gatherings are now through fun-themed Zoom meetings. Bids are still given and when these women accept our bids, they become "New Members" of our sorority. They complete a 4-5 week New Member Education program to learn our history, songs, people, Constitution and Bylaws, branding guidelines, the Greek alphabet, and more. They are tested each week to ensure they are mastering the information. This is done through six 2-hour meetings that I am also a part of. The NMs also interview each Active member, a member of the BoD and AAA, and speak with their assigned Alumnae Mentor weekly (and then monthly once they are initiated).

They also participate in 10 hours of community service, make a class banner, write a class song, and present a scrapbook of their time in the program. Imagine them coordinating all of this and doing it all online! One of the New Members in Fall '20 was doing the NM program from her home in Central New York! The Actives plan the secret Initiation date where the NMs then become "Active members" at that time. I need to give credit to one of our newest Actives, Audrey Brown, a senior and the New Member Educator, who was only a NM herself this past Spring '20 and whose program was interrupted by COVID. Samantha Twing Markham '20 (previous NME), was able to teach all the information they were missing through Zoom and lead them to membership soon afterwards. Spring '20 was formally initiated when they returned to school in the Fall! Audrey did a great job as NME this past fall and 3 New Members were initiated in Fall '20.

We will post the upcoming Initiation date for Spring '21 as we get closer and hope some of you will be able to Zoom in to see our membership in action. We all look forward to building our membership in Spring '21 as the college continues to guide us through these difficult times.

It's Election Time Again!

Our Governance documents strive to make the election process very transparent. We have limited consecutive terms and term limits. (Terms begin August 1st). Nominees for Board of Director positions are strongly recommended but not required to have served in an office or committee for a year.

Agonian Alumnae Association Open Positions:

<u>Vice President</u> – Two-year term, limit of two consecutive terms.

Responsibilities:

- 1. Facilitate the Reunion Weekend Committee and the Newsletter Committee
- 2. Recruit Class Representatives to collect news for the newsletter
- 3. Participate in regular meetings, phone calls, emails, etc. with the officers of the AAA
- 4. Assist the President and perform the functions of the President if absent or unable to perform them

<u>Treasurer</u> --Two-year term, limit of two consecutive terms.

Responsibilities:

- 1. Oversee the annual budget and the budget process
- 2. Supervise withdrawal of funds; ensure that all bills are paid
- 3. Collect dues and donations and make deposits in a timely manner
- 4. Maintain a shared, updated list of AAA members and contributors
- 5. Participate in regular meetings, phone calls, emails, etc. with the officers of the AAA

Board of Directors Open Position:

Member at Large-Three-year term, limit of two consecutive terms. Possible responsibilities could include:

- 1. Work with the Agonian Alumnae Association Communications Director to update Agonian website information
- 2. Serve as a liaison to the Potsdam Community and SUNY Potsdam College/Clarkson University
- 3. Assist Board of Director officers on key projects, as needed
- 4. Serve as a liaison between the Board of Directors and other committees such as the Advisory Committee, the Community Service Committee, the AAA Scholarship Committee (if requested by the AAA) and any ad hoc projects of committees required by the board.

Annually, your AAA votes on whether to give a special scholarship or multiple scholarships to benefit the Actives. This year, despite the COVID pandemic, three scholarships were approved and two of them were given during the Fall 2020 semester. The third, the Eunice "Brownie" Badger award for Community Service, will be offered Spring 2021.

The Scholarship Committee was made up of Cheryl Welles, coordinator and 5 judges: Denise Aiello Bukovan, Terry McSweeney, Jane Judson Mistur, Mindy Poupore, and Jacquie Shellman.

Our first scholarship was created to highlight a special Active Agonian's academic strengths in honor of Laurena Ramsdell. Laurena was a 1929 graduate of Potsdam with an education major and later became Ago's Faculty Advisor. Our Laurena Ramsdell Scholarship for Academic Excellence recipient is Kaitlyn Rivera.

Kaitlyn is a Junior pursuing a double major in International Studies and Anthropology with a minor in Social Justice. Kaitlyn is on the President's List and a member of the Honors Program. She takes on a large credit load and big social responsibilities in Ago because she loves being involved and loves being around her sisters. She is currently the 1st VP/ Academic and Judicial Affairs Officer within the house and outside of Ago, she is the Academic Chair for the All-Greek Council and the Jr. Rush Chair for Inter-Sorority Council. After graduation from Potsdam, she plans to take some time before beginning her Master's program and join the Peace Corps, then

attend Syracuse University or Boston University.

Graduating During a Pandemic Katrina Surdyka '20

The best part of this Spring in Ago was finding my little, Kali McCracken. Unfortunately, she was not able to make the original Bid Day, but she is still the perfect little. Kali found it challenging to get closer to sisters with so much distance between them. When I asked Kali about her experience she said:

"The best part for me was of course, finding out you were my big, and I have loved the time I got to spend with my Spring '20 class. They made everything fun. The hardest part was being sent home and not getting the chance to get to know the other sisters".

When the pandemic made it to SUNY Potsdam I was still in La La Land. The pandemic had not registered in my brain until every sister had left. So many thoughts that I may never see any of these girls again ran through my head. At first, I busied myself by putting together the New Member education books. As time went on, my brother convinced me to come home.

Driving home was a goodbye to the memories I was supposed to make in my final year in Ago; this was my last semester to make memories as an Active, singing, laughing, and loving with my Ago sisters. The hardest part of leaving was everything finally felt real. It was the final strike to say it was all over. My senior year was done and without the planned goodbyes. It broke my heart that I finally found people who I love so dearly and who love me so dearly. Worse of all I never got to take photos with sisters in our graduation caps and gowns.

What it means to be an Ago has not changed for me. It is a family where I can always lean on others and they can lean on me. Like the word "sisters", we will not always get along but that is natural. At the same time, there is so much love being spread and received. Part of the disagreements are made from love. Not everyone is perfect but for the most part sisters care and do what they believe is best for others and the whole Ago family.

Navigating Uncharted Waters Amber Reynoso- Active President

My name is Amber Reynoso; I joined Ago in Fall 2018 and I am currently the President of the Agonian Sorority. Leading our house during a pandemic has been one of the most difficult tasks I have ever taken on. Before I was elected to become President, I was given the opportunity to shadow the previous President to ensure that this position was something I wanted to take on, something I could handle. However, no one predicted we would be in the middle of a pandemic and no one really took into account how different being President of a house is, compared to being the President of a house during a pandemic, which has proven to be an entire new ball game. Everything I thought I knew was wrong and I had to learn how to lead a house that was not made to fit COVID-19 guidelines.

How do you have sister bonding without being able to step foot in the same room?

How do you make sure no one feels alone or isolated when we are being told that is what we should do because wanting to be in the company of your sister is not recommended?

Though last semester was a huge challenge we did it, not without hiccups and mistakes but we overcame one of the biggest hurdles of our lifetime. Each week we had to adapt in order to accomplish what almost seemed impossible, with the support of our Alumnae and I cannot stress this enough, TECHNOLOGY!

Though Fall semester was very hectic and unpredictable we accomplished a lot! During the semester we were able to move our entire rush process and other necessary house meetings to a platform called Zoom. During the rush season we delivered the necessary items needed to participate in our events to those who RSVP'd. We ran our events completely virtually with the exception of two rush events, which we had to follow strict COVID-19 guidelines and could not exceed 25 people with sisters included. Through this process we were able to welcome three amazing young women into our sisterhood. We also made it into the local Potsdam paper for our group community service hours; we decorated and packed goodie bags then donated them to the dogs in the local humane society. To bridge the division within the house, since those who did not resided at 11P were not allowed to come over, we got together often played virtual games such as "Quiplash" and "Among Us" and had virtual house dinners. Each sister had their own meals in order to follow COVID guidelines and we would eat together and catch up via Zoom. Lastly, as a house we were able to gain and bring new expectations and relations to Ago that many of us may have taken for granted or had not necessarily felt before, with both Active and Alumnae. You do not necessarily realize the importance of being present not in terms of just physically but also mentally until you can no longer be together. Many join a Sorority without understanding what it takes or means to be a sisterhood, but this semester I think we accomplished true sisterhood. When it seemed like everything around us was crumbling, we were able to learn how to be just what each other needed and overcome the inevitable.
