Last year, through the generosity of Agonian Board Member Karen Lorenz Walker '82, Ago sold handmade "anchor masks" to raise money for the future kitchen renovation. Not only did Karen sew over 200 masks, but she personally donated all the materials, as well as providing the postage to send them out, so that all of your mask donations could be channeled toward the future kitchen renovation at 11 Pierrepont. Approximately 30 masks were sent to 11 Pierrepont for the Active members. And YOU, as Alumnae, did not disappoint! Not only did many of you order multiple masks for a \$20/mask donation, dozens of you sent additional house donations ranging from \$50-\$1000. Between your mask purchases, extra donations and the payment of "Gold Dues" (half goes to the house), several thousand dollars were raised last year for the kitchen fundraiser, general fundraiser and house repairs.

Board of Directors Open Positions

Secretary: 3-year term, limit of two consecutive terms Responsibilities:

- Keep current on all correspondence of the Sorority.
- Record accurate minutes at all Board of Director meetings and disseminate them accordingly, prior to the next meeting.
- Ensure completion of all Corporate filings.
- Maintain the list for the Board of all Board Officers/Members who signed the required Agonian Sorority Code of Conduct Exhibit 1.
- Keep a list of proposed changes to the Bylaws for the next Governance Document Review Committee.

Member at Large: 3-year term, limit of 2 consecutive terms 4 positions open

Possible Responsibilities to include:

- Work with the AAA Communications Director to update Agonian website information.
- Serve as a liaison to the Potsdam Community and SUNY Potsdam College/Clarkson University.
- Assist Board of Director Officers on key projects, as needed.
- Serve as liaison between the Board of Directors and other Committees such as the Advisory Committee, the Community Service Committee, the AAA Scholarship Committee (If requested by the AAA) and any ad hoc projects or committees required by the Board.

Agonian Alumnae Association Open positions

President: *Two-year term, limit of two consecutive terms.* **Responsibilities:**

- Oversee AAA Officers.
- Lead annual meeting and any other mtgs required for the AAA including phone calls, conference calls, emails.
- Submit a report at the annual AAA meeting.
- Enforce the Agonian Code of Conduct.
- Be an active participant on the Agonian Board of Directors.
- Authorize ad hoc teams as needed. Recruit all team chairs.
- Be impartial on all AAA business matters and votes. However, in case of tie or one less than required vote, the President will vote.
- Work with the AAA Treasurer to annually review and oversee a regular audit of financial books for the AAA.
- Communicate with the Active Sisters about newsletter and scholarship, coordinate and communicate with appropriate Board members.
- Enforce Risk Management Policies at Alumnae gatherings and when Alumnae are interacting with Active members.
- Appoint a Parliamentarian for the annual AAA meeting who shall have Robert's Rules of Order present. If the Communications Director is not present, appointment a Sister who is present to take meeting minutes, read aloud the minutes of the previous meeting and take attendance.
- In conjunction with the other AAA Officers, appoint an Alumna to temporarily fill an office that is vacant until the next term.

Communications Director: *Two-year term, limit of two consecutive terms* **Responsibilities:**

- Maintain the Agonian website, including information from the AAA, Board of Directors, and Active Sisters.
- Maintain an updated database of addresses and emails of all Agonian Alumnae.
- Coordinate all social media accounts.
- Write thank you notes for dues, donations and any other correspondence on behalf of the AAA.
- Maintain records of the AAA Officers and members who sign the Agonian Sorority Code of Conduct Exhibit 1.
- Submit a report at the annual AAA meeting.

- Participate in regular meetings, phone calls, emails, etc. with the officers of the AAA.
- Email the Anchor working with the Newsletter Team.
- Email requests for dues, Reunion, etc.

Member at Large/ New Member Educator Denise "Dede" Haines '81

Serving on the Board of Directors as a Member at Large, I am currently the liaison to the New Member Educator, no longer called "Pledge Mistress", which allows for open communication between the Active Membership and the Board of Directors during the New Member Education program.

With Covid numbers falling, the Fall 2021 semester allowed the Actives to get away from Zoom for Rush and were able to finally meet for in-person activities. Bids were distributed and with only 8 Rushes either eligible or open to taking bids, we welcomed our lovely Emily Esack, a junior at Potsdam.

Just a reminder that when these women accept our bids, they become "New Members" of our sorority, not "pledges". New Members (NMs) complete a 4–5-week New Member Education program to learn our history, songs, important people, the Constitution and Bylaws, branding guidelines, the Greek alphabet, and more. This is done through six 2-hour meetings that I virtually attend. The NMs are tested each meeting to be sure they have learned and retained the information in their previous meetings. The NMs also interview each Active member, a member of each the BoD and AAA, and speak with their assigned Alumnae Mentor weekly (and then monthly once they are initiated). The NMs also go on a Scavenger Hunt after learning about the important people of Ago and the history/locations of our past Agonian homes.

The Actives also plan a few activities at the house with the NMs, so they have a chance to mingle and get to know one another better as well as have song sessions to help the NMs learn their songs. The Actives secretly plan Serenade where the Big Sisters present their anchors to their Littles.

The NMs must also perform 10 hours of community service, some of which is alongside the Active membership. During their program they must also make a class banner, write a class song, and prepare a scrapbook of photos of their time in the program. The Actives plan a secret Initiation date where the NMs become "Active" members and are presented with their first Ago hoodie and pin. Initiation is followed by the NMs presenting their banner and scrapbook, and then sing their class song.

Our New Member Educator this school year is Hannah Thurston, an education major at Potsdam, who will be student teaching locally this Spring semester.

We are always looking for alumnae to run for Board positions when terms end. If you are interested, please reach out to any of us on the Board. In addition, we are always in need of alumnae to serve as mentors to our incoming members.

Pandemic Ups and Downs- What I Have Learned

As in previous years, **Joyce Moulton McAmmond-Coleman '62** (editor-in-chief of "The Raquette" in college) shares her writing skills with her Ago sisters. She says this reflection was initially accompanied with far less enthusiasm than in other years. It wasn't until she began to contemplate how this pandemic has impacted our lives, that she realized how much she appreciated the life she leads:

Despite living pretty much center-city here in Rochester, it is a privilege to have a home with a decent-sized yard so that contact with others happens only by choice; Covid-19 does not have a chance to cause us a problem if we follow safe practices!

We also have a small summer place in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains, where in the warmer months, we can escape city-living and continue social distancing - swimming, kayaking, fishing, or just hiking the hilly roads overlooking the lake. Staying safe is easy! BUT:

There are so many others throughout the US and around the world who live in extremely crowded situations, where 'staying safe' means struggling to just live, to find food, shelter and clean water. Their lives are far from easy! I try to imagine living in a crowded situation during this pandemic - an apartment building where encountering others is to be avoided for safety's sake, opening an apartment door and checking the hallway before leaving so as to avoid another person in an inside space not able to social-distance. Then, needing to use the elevator with limits to number of people allowed, needing to return to your apartment to wait until there is room in an elevator or choosing to chance the stairway and when reaching the exterior of your apartment, being up-close and personal, face to face with others, waiting at bus stops, riding crowded public transport and always wearing a MASK!

It's been a year since Fran last asked for our "news" or more precisely, our lack-of-news...! Let's keep our fingers crossed and Stay Safe!

An Agonian Who Made a Difference: Jane Blodgett Hurley '54

The Agonian community is saddened to announce the passing of **Jane Blodgett Hurley '54**, one of our Alumnae that continued to make significant contributions to Ago well after leaving college. Jane married Daniel Hurley, who later joined the faculty at SUNY Potsdam, resulting in Jane's return to Potsdam where she taught Kindergarten at St. Mary's School. Dan eventually became Dean of Men (later renamed Dean of Students). In his role as Student Government Advisor, Dan interacted with many of our Ago sisters of the '70s, inviting them into his home where they also enjoyed spending time with Jane and their five children. Visits to the Hurley household became standard for many students, including Ago sisters, over the decades. Jane served as Advisor to Ago and served on our Board of Directors. Jane became a very important fixture to the Agos of that time period and when word of her passing circulated, we received several reflections from our Alumnae on how they depended on her for guidance and wisdom during their college years. Alumnae report that their visits to the Hurley household continued for decades, as they would stop in to visit each time, they visited Potsdam for Ago Reunions or to serve SUNY Potsdam in some capacity. Below are a few of the comments received by the Anchor team:

-I have great memories of Dean Hurley and his wife. When I was Purser, Mrs.Hurley was a great local resource. Dean Hurley also was of great help when I inherited a lot of room and board debt from the previous year; he persuaded these people to pay in only the way he could do it with kindness and a smile. ~ Vera Thurston Gibbs '78

-Maybe it's because Jane was a devoted teacher and/or had 5 kids... but it never seemed to bother her that all these college students would arrive at the house unannounced. She'd invite us to stay for dinner or rustle up a snack. She was laid back and had a great sense of humor. It was always fun for us Alums to stop at the house to visit Dan AND Jane during Reunion



Weekends. Jane never lost her love of Ago and her Ago sisters. She would talk about the Agos from her class who were in town for reunions.
